PASTOR'S CORNER

Dear Church family and friends,

In one way, it seems as though it was just a few days ago that I stepped into the pulpit for the first time as your Interim Pastor. In other ways, it's hard for me to remember it's only been about eight months as Connie and I immediately felt at home with you and so much has happened since. When we began this journey together, I had certain expectations of the future, as I'm sure you all did as well. I knew the search process for the new permanent pastor was already well started. I reviewed the preparation work that was accomplished with the assistance of the Converge Great Lakes office and really thought the six-month interim period we agreed on would be more than sufficient. Then Covid-19 hit! God, of course, was not surprised and I can see in retrospect how He was preparing us for ministry during the crisis even though we had no idea of what was to come. With more than one very good candidate, it would have been easy for the process to breakdown into a partisan struggle for personal preference, but that did not happen. The entire search committee continued to be prayerfully mindful that in the end, the new pastor needed to be God's choice, not a personal choice.

As I end my time with you, I am thrilled that God allowed me to be your undershepherd during this critical time. From discussions regarding paying off the building mortgage early to dealing with Covid-19 closure and reopening, I have seen God's hand of guidance and protection. My time with you really is an ending of a chapter in your history, and I am excited to watch how the next chapter unfolds as Jonathon Enger joins EBBC as the pastor.

Finally, I can think of no better words to share with you than these penned by the Apostle Paul to the church at Philippi. "I thank my God every time I remember you, constantly praying with joy in every one of my prayers for all of you, because of your sharing the Gospel from the first day until now. New Pastor Coming to EBBC—

June 13th and 14th was the weekend that Pastoral candidate Jonathon Enger, his wife Anika, and three children, Levi age 7, Josiah age 4, and Lucia-15 months came to East Balsam. On Saturday afternoon there was a Meet & Greet time. Pastor Jonathon spoke Sunday morning followed by almost two hours of Questions & Answers. Members of church returned at 4:00 p.m. to vote on whether or not to call Jonathon as our pastor. The vote was 37 yes and 3 no. Jonathon called with his answer on Monday, saying they will come to EBBC. His first Sunday will be August 16th.

Changes in Way of Doing Ministry—

Sunday morning worship was Livestreamed only from March 21st until May 17th. Since the May date, people are meeting in the church building but Livestreaming is available for those who choose to continue to stay home.

GETTING TO KNOW YOU

Jenni and Jeromy Cox first became acquainted when Jenni was in third grade and was best friends with Jeromy's sister. Jeromy, being about three years older, looked at Jenni as just another "bratty little kid" (his words, not mine). But the Lord knew even back then what wonderful things were in store for these two and the amazing journey they would take.

As a child, Jenni attended summer Bible camps, had religious instruction and an awareness of God. Yet, as she began dating in high school, she was torn between the desire to live life the way she wanted to and a strong desire for knowing that God loved her personally. She began to pray, asking God for guidance in seeking Him. She questioned whether she should continue in a relationship she had with an unbelieving boyfriend. Jenni began to notice that when she prayed, God answered in miraculous ways over the course of the next four years.

A young man Jenni had never met before pulled her aside one evening at a street dance and presented to her the gospel message of saving faith in Jesus Christ. He told her he felt compelled to share Jesus with her that night-this in answer to Jenni's prayer that if God wanted her to seek Him, He would have to let her know what to do.

Another time Jenni questioned God about how she could know the Bible was true. Soon after, she stepped on a tract lying on the sidewalk of her apartment. The tract was entitled, "How do you know you can trust the Bible?"



As Jenni entered college she came to a crossroads, realizing she had to move forward with her faith in Christ or leave it behind. Through the college experience she was invited to begin attending church and joined Campus Crusade for Christ. A book she read entitled, "Falling in Love with Jesus" impacted her to break up with her unbelieving boyfriend and realize she "didn't need a man."

Jeromy was raised by parents from the South in the good old Southern Baptist tradition of being in church every time the doors were open. He attended Sunday school, Awana, and church services and was keenly aware of his need of Jesus Christ as Savior. It was during a summer camp experience at Woodlake Bible Camp that the

speaker for the week impressed upon him that Jesus needed to be the Lord of his life. It was then that Jeromy realized he not only needed Jesus as Savior, but he needed to turn his life over to the Lordship of Christ.

Jeromy entered the Army after graduating from high school and served a three-year enlistment. It was while he was in boot camp, away from all things home and familiar, far away from the safety net of family and friends, that he grew to depend on God. He discovered, as Jeromy put it, "I was His."

Returning from his stint in the service, Jeromy went back to school. He found he was still somewhat alone so he contacted his younger sister and asked for contact information for Jenni. The friendship between the two of them deepened. Jeromy encouraged Jenni to continue to "keep praying and He (God) will reveal Himself to you." Their friendship became a little bit interesting when Jenni announced to Jeromy that she "didn't need" a man. Yet, in God's wisdom, He drew them together. They were married in 2006.

Jenni and Jeromy have four children. Jenni is employed full time as a teacher of special needs children in the Unity Middle School. She has been active in ministering to children at East Balsam Baptist Church in the recent past, taking a bit of a break following the death of her mother and as she has adjusted to returning to the work place. Jeromy is the tall dark-haired man who plays guitar as part of the worship team. Jeromy serves on the Unity School Board and is employed as a guard at the Polk County Jail in Balsam Lake.

Bruce & Candice Beatham—Wycliffe Bible Translators in Mexico

On June 23rd Bruce and Candice reported a 7.4 earthquake that hit about 150 miles from where they live; they were swaying for about a minute but no damage where they live. People living closer to the epicenter did suffer a lot of damage.

There were very few people getting COVID-19 at that time and people were working from home as much as possible.

They have been updating some of their literacy books, mostly making changes in how they mark the tones of the language. Their roles as supervisors are greater since people in the organization are either displaced or more isolated; they have to figure out how to keep everyone working.

They report that their children are doing well.

John & Lori De Cleene-Mobilization Associates, Converge

I don't have an up-to-date report from John DeCleene. He will be a guest speaker on July 19th as Pastor Mandley had other plans for the weekend.

Steve & Carol Jean Gallagher—Wycliffe Bible Translators

Praise the Lord that they ministry budget reached 100% so they were able to start working on Wycliffe Bible Translators projects. Steve has been working on a consultation for the Saisai language group in Papua New Guinea. That one was done remotely. In the future he hopes to do in-person consultations a few times a year.

Carol Jean has been in training for her job as an administrative assistant for Wycliffe's recruitment team. This team works to make initial contacts with people who may be interested in joining the ministry of Bible translation.

Steve and Carol Jean went to New Jersey in early March to be with Steve's mother, Elsa, while she had radiation treatments for lung cancer. After three weeks of treatment, she ended up in the emergency room. Tests revealed the cancer had spread to her brain and is inoperable. She has now been home on hospice for several weeks. Steve's sister, Lois, is also at Elsa's home to help care for her. Steve and Carol Jean continue to do their Wycliffe work from New Jersey.

Katherine Taylor—Teacher with CAMA, Laos

Katherine is taking a leave of absence from CAMA to get guardianship for her mother, Emily Taylor. Her mother is in a memory care facility called Brookdale in Eden Prairie.

Ways to pray for Katherine include-

- She misses not seeing her mother other than by window visits.
- She needs to find a job.
- For encouragement as she sounds discouraged.

Gil & Norene Zinke—Training Leaders International (TLI)

Trips Cancelled: Two trips, one in May and one in June/July, were canceled because of COVID-19. Gil asks for prayer that the October trip won't be cancelled.

Ethiopia: Christians in Ethiopia are suffering. One pastor has two of his own children who should be at the university confined at home. He also has children of rural relatives residing in his home, so he has seven mouths to feed in his household. The pandemic has highly affected the economy so he has "no ministry and no income.". His wife works a part time job.

Churches and hotels are being burned, there are riots with many people being killed, and the Internet has been locked down nationwide.

Professor S: Gil has had the opportunity to meet with a Japanese man who is a physics professor studying in the U.S. for one year. He is in a Bible study group and had questions about the Bible. Gil, who grew up in Japan as the son of missionaries, is able to answer his questions in Japanese. Professor S is devouring God's Word by reading many chapters every day.
